Wildlife and Ecology

Where have all the birds gone?

A question raised by several members over the last few weeks and one that does come up regularly at this time of year, but it really does seem a bit quiet out there. We have, until a few days ago, had a really mild autumn/winter so many birds that would come to our gardens at this time of year simply haven't had the need as there's still been food enough out in the hedgerows and fields and many birds of course do migrate to somewhere warmer. So now we have got some more seasonal weather don't forget to put some food and water out for the birds. It will pay off.

Where we have had a definite reduction in wildlife of course is over Broad Hill (the area from Broad Hill proper across to Halstead Road and the Common). The building work has taken out some key territory for both residents and winter visitors, Yellowhammers that were resident all year around in small numbers along the old enclosure hedgerows seem to have gone completely this winter, and of course the Skylark nesting areas now have houses on them. The loss of habitat also means that the small flocks of Redwings and Fieldfares that come in winter have gone elsewhere with only the odd single bird about. Which is all very depressing for a bird watcher

BUT spring is on its way and with the better weather who knows what we will see return and what will take up residence on the drainage ponds and small wildlife areas included within the new housing area.

Big Garden Birdwatch

If anyone here in Mountsorrel took part in the RSPB's Big Garden Birdwatch at the end of January please share your results with us so that we can do a Mountsorrel Report. To date we have only 4 sets of figures which isn't really enough to make to worthwhile.
