> R F Martin, the quarry manager 'entertained 50 of the aged poor with dinner at the Red Lion Coffee House, The bill of fare, as in previous years, consisted of seasonable viands. After dinner the tables were cleared, and tobacco and pipes were provided for those who chose to "take" the fragrant weed, with a glass of beer. Subsequently, a substantial tea was served. Mr. R. F. Martin welcomed his guests, and expressed the pleasure it gave him to meet them again. A capital programme of songs, etc., was provided for the evening,
