MISTERTON is a parish, including the hamlets of Poultney and Walcote, the latter being 2 miles E. from Lutterworth, 8 N.W. from Rugby, in the hundred and rural deanery of Guthlaxton No. 3, and division of Gilmorton for the County Council, Lutterworth union and County Court district. The small river Swift passes through the parish. St. Leonard's Church is a handsome building (Early English and Decorated) of the 13th century, comprising chancel, nave and aisles, with tower, four bells and spire. The chancel windows are stained. It contains a tomb, with figure in arms of Poultney round the head, and the inscription, "Here lyeth Michl Poultney, some time Lord of Poultney and Misterton, A.D. 1567." There are fine fragments of ancient panelling. In 1863 the church was restored partly at the expense of the late Rev. G. H. Franks. The Registers date from 1558. The living is a rectory of the yearly value of £490. There is a National School and some small charities. A Reading Room is opened during the winter months, under the super-

MOUNTSORREL, anciently called Mount Soar hill, is a quaint and rugged but picturesque market town, situated on the west side of the river Soar, and at the foot of a ridge of rocky hills, which extend westward through Charnwood Forest into Derbyshire. It consists mainly of one street over a mile long, with small branch streets on either side. It is in West Goscote hundred, rural deanery of East Akeley, County Court district and division of Loughborough, and Barrow union, on the high road from Leicester to Loughborough, being distant 7 and 4 miles from those towns respectively, being 1½ miles W. from the Barrow and nearly 2 miles from the Sileby stations on the Midland Railway, with which it runs nearly parallel north and south. It is in the division of Barrow for the County Council. A hugh range of rocks rise abruptly on the western side of the township from 100 to 150 feet above the river. The Mountsorrel Granite Company are sole lessees, under the Earl of Lanesborough, for working the widelyknown sienitic granite, red and grey, which are harder and tougher than those of Scotland, and therefore better adapted for road making and for millstones than for building. The stone has been worked for upwards of a century, but operations have been vastly extended during the last 40 years by the introduction of new order. duction of powerful machinery and more elaborate organisation. A branch line extends from the quarry to the Midland railway at Barrow. From 80,000 to 100,000 tons are sent to all parts of the kingdom every

year, and employment is given to over 600 men and boys. The Company have erected blocks of nearly 100 small buildings for the accommodation of their St. Peter's Church is a plain, ancient workpeople. building, of the Perpendicular period, comprising chancel, nave, and embattled tower, in which are six bells. The church has recently been restored and reseated, and a new screen placed between the chancel and the nave, the gift of Mr. J. R. Edmonds, at a There are three stained windows to cost of £300. the memory of Bishop Beveridge, of St. Asaph's. The Registers date from 1677. The vicarage is of the annual value of £280, which is nearly all derived from Bishop Beveridge's estate, and is in the gift of the Bishop of Peterborough. At the south end, at the upper end of the Green and rise of the hill, is Christ's Church, a handsome Early English building, It is built of Mountwith neat parsonage house. sorrel stone, with white sandstone facings, and comprises chancel, nave, tower, and small spire. It cost with the parsonage £5500, which was entirely defrayed by Miss Brinton, of Berks. She endowed it with £80 a year. Nearly 20 acres of land are attached to the parsonage. There are Wesleyan, Primitive, Reformed Methodist, and Baptist Chapels. The old Baptist Chapel was erected by the Presbyterians, and was several times preached in by Dr. Isaac Watts, the poet and divine. A new chapel was erected in 1879 at a cost of £1000. A National School was founded in 1742 by Mr. George Danvers, in which

the master taught twelve poor boys, nominated by the lord of the manor, and for doing so was paid £9 a year, and also provided with a house and garden. The Infant School was built 1847 by Lady Lanesborough, who pays £10 a year towards the stipend of These schools were superseded about the mistress. 1873 by two good schools, one in St. Peter's and the other in Christ's Church. St. Peter's School receives the excellent merit grant, and passes a percentage of 96. A night school, established and mainly supported by Mr. R. F. Martin, is well attended and is one of the largest in the county. About the middle of the town there once stood a cross, but it was removed near the end of the last century, and on its site a small building was erected for a Market house. It is surmounted by a cupola, with entablature of freestone, supported by eight cylindrical columns. There is a Mechanics' Institution, with reading room and library of 650 volumes. It was founded about 1852, The Red Lion Coffee and numbers 100 members. House was established by the Mountsorrel Granite Co, connected with which is a reading room and library for the workmen. There are considerable library for the workmen. charities, amounting to nearly £100 a year, which is distributed chiefly in coal. A cemetery of an acre and a half of land was formed at the north end of the town in 1859, at a cost of £1000, which was raised by rate. During the year 1887 another acre was added, the cost being £75. The market was held every Friday, but has recently been discontinued. There is a pleasure fair on the 10th of July. The late Mr. John Mitchell left £270 to the stewards of the Wesleyan Chapel for the interest to be given away at Christmas to poor widows and widowers of Mountsorrel, irrespective of sect. NAILSTONE is a parish in the Bosworth division, Sparkenhoe hundred and rural deanery No. 1, comprising the townships of Barton-in-the-Beans and Nailstone, in the Market Bosworth union and County Court district, and division of Ibstock for the County Council. Nailstone village is on the Hinckley and Ashby road, 3 miles N. by E. from Market Bosworth, 9 N. from Hinckley, and 12 from Leicester. Earl Howe is lord of the manor, but Mr. Cosmo Neville owns part of the lordship, in which are extensive collieries, opened in 1863, and employing over 200 hands. All Saints' Church is an imposing structure, chiefly of the Early Decorated style, comprising chancel, nave, north aisle, massive tower and broach spire, rising to the height of 117 feet. good organ was presented by the late Earl Howe in 1844. The Church was thoroughly restored and repaired in 1853, at a cost of £1750, towards which his lordship contributed £1250. A handsome stained glass window was inserted in the south aisle by Mr. Samuel Knowles, at a cost of £40. A new heating apparatus was added, and some improvements effected in the interior, at a cost of £100. In 1885 E. G. B. Watts, Esq., presented a carved oak eagle lectern. The church underwent further restoration in 1888, the interior walls being repaired at the expense of E. G.
