MOUNTSORREL, BARROW-UPON-SOAR, COSSINGTON, AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

MOUNTSORREL is a small market town and chapelry, partly in the parish of Rothley, but chiefly in that of Barrow-upon-Soar; 105 miles from London, 13 w. from Melton Mowbray, 7 n. from Leicester, and 21 s. e. from Derby. Its name is derived from its situation, being on a steep craggy *mount*, near the banks of the river Soar, and prior to the Conquest it was called *Soar Hill*. On the western side of the town is the termination of a range of high hills, extending into Derbyshire; the highest point, nearly overhanging the town, is denominated 'Castle Hill,' where once stood a fortress, that is mentioned as early as the reign of King Stephen, when it was assigned to Robert le Bossu, Earl of Leicester and his heirs, on condition that Ralph, Earl of Chester, who also laid claim to it, should, with his family, be amicably received within the borough, bailwick, and castle, whenever they might choose to reside there. In 1167, Robert Blanchmains, Earl of Leicester, on his rebellion against Henry II was dispossessed of it, with his other estates; the latter were subsequently restored to him, but the King retained the castle, and governors were appointed to hold it during this and

succeeding reigns. In 1215 it was garrisoned by Saer de Quincey, its governor, for the Dauphin of France, whom the barons had invited to their assistance; and when the royal cause became triumphant in the beginning of the reign of Henry III was taken and entirely demolished. The hill of Mountsorrel is a rock of reddish granite, with pieces of which the streets are paved; in many places the rock stands out bare,—and the stone is of such a hard nature, after being exposed to the atmosphere, that scarcely any tool can be found to work it. In this town formerly stood a curious cross, which was taken down in 1793, and removed into the grounds of Sir John Danvers, who erected a small market-house (in imitation of a pavilion) in its stead. In addition to the usual manorial courts, a court of pleas is held every three weeks, for the recovery of small debts, within the eastern and western divisions of the hundred of Goscote, having the same jurisdiction of that district as a county court has over the county at large. The manufacture of worsted hose, and net lace, employed, at one time, several of the inhabitants—these branches have declined here, but in the neighbouring chapelry of Quorndon, the

making of bobbin-net lace is extensively carried on : the principal trade of Mountsorrel is that in stone ; the Soar canal affording facilities for its conveyance, for the repair of the roads, throughout the neighbourhood.

The places of worship are, the chapel of ease to the vicarage of Barrow, and others for the use of baptists, presbyterians, unitarians and Wesleyan methodists. A free school for educating twelve boys, was founded and endowed by Sir John Danvers in 1742 ; and there is another conducted upon the national plan. The natural features of this place are singularly romantic, and the views from the higher points of the town are extensive. The weekly market is held on Monday ; and a fair annually on the 9th of July, for toys, pedlery, &c. The chapelry contained, in 1821, 1,422 inhabitants, and in 1831, 1,602.

BARROW-UPON-SOAR is rather an extensive parish, partly in the eastern, but chiefly in the western division of the hundred of Goscote ; the village being pleasantly situate about two miles w. from Mountsorrel, near the river Soar, and the Loughborough canal passes through the parish. Barrow has been for many centuries famous for the production of a hard blue stone, which being calcined makes a very fine lime cement—hard, firm, and much in request for water-works, dams, flood-gates, &c. ; it is also an article of exportation, Holland and some other neighbouring countries taking off annually large quantities.

In constructing Ramsgate pier, the Barrow lime-stone was found to succeed, after the Dutch terras mortar had failed. The places of worship are the parish church, dedicated to the Holy Trinity, and a chapel for Wesleyan methodists : the living is a vicarage, in the patronage of the master and fellows of St. John's College, Cambridge. The charities comprise a free grammar school, founded and endowed by Humphrey Perkins, in 1717, and almshouses, for aged bachelors or widows. The parish includes the chapelries of MOUNTSORREL, QUORNDON, and WOODHOUSE, which contained together, in 1821, 5,560 inhabitants, and in 1831, 6,254, of which last number 1,638 were returned for Barrow village.

COSSINGTON is a parish, in the eastern division of the hundred of Goscote : the village, which is small, is situate about two miles and a half s. e. by e. from Mountsorrel. The parish is bounded on the west and on the south by the rivers Soare and Wreake, near which latter is a tumulus of oblong form, three hundred and fifty feet in length, one hundred and twenty in breadth, and forty in height ; very steep, and extending due north and south ; it is called 'Shipley Hill,' and supposed to be the monument of some Danish king. The church is dedicated to All Saints ; and the living is a rectory, in the patronage of Thomas Babbington, Esq. The parish (which has no dependent township) contained, in 1831, 283 inhabitants.

WIGSTON AND NEIGHBOURHOOD.

WIGSTON is a village, in the parish of Wigstou-
Magna, and hundred of Guthlaxton: the village being
situate about 4 miles s. s. e. from Leicester, on the
road from that town to Welford. It was formerly
called "Wigston Two Steeples," from its having two
churches; one of these has fallen nearly to decay, and
its remains appropriated to the use of a school-room,
where poor children are taught to read and write, at
the expense of the parishioners. The other church is
dedicated to All Saints; the living is a discharged

vicarage, in the alternate patronage of the master and
wardens of the Haberdasher's Company, and the
Governors of Christ's Hospital, London. Here are
a hospital or almshouse for six poor widows and as
many widowers, endowed by Miss Clark; and a luna-
tic asylum: the latter, which has been established
about thirty years, is situate in a retired and salubrious
spot. The Union canal passes through the parish—
which contained, in 1821, 2,089 inhabitants; and in
1831, 2,174.
